How is public education funded in Maine?

The State of Maine uses a formula called Essential Programs and Services (EPS) to calculate its baseline funding for public education every year. These ratios can be found on the ED 279 report for RSU/MSAD 58.

There are multiple variables that go into this calculation, but the two that impact us most are **enrollment** and **town valuations**.

Here's the breakout of the 25/26 EPS allocation per town based on **enrollment**. Strong has the most students in MSAD 58, and therefore has the highest dollar amount for their allocation.

The district is then required to pay a local share of the total EPS budget, which is split up by each town's **valuation**. This is why Kingfield pays the highest amount, even though it has fewer students.

The required local share is subtracted from the total EPS amount, and the state subsidizes the remaining balance:

MSAD 58 Total EPS Allocation	\$7,669,336.81
Required Local EPS Contribution (what we pay)	- \$2,642,621.67
Total State Subsidy (before adjustments)	\$5,026,715.14

But wait...the town totals in the proposed school budget are much higher. Why?

Remember: the state's funding formula is for <u>essential</u> programs and services (think: english, math, science). It's designed to cover roughly half of our school budget.

So while we pay a <u>required</u> local share in order to get the state subsidy, the district also asks us to make an <u>additional</u> local contribution to cover the rest.

For example, our EPS allocation for co- and extracurricular activities is \$48,720, but MSAD 58 is budgeting \$324,703 for co-curriculars and athletics. The \$275,983 difference is raised through the *additional* local share of taxes.

Here are the combined totals each town pays:

Three of our towns are among the top 5 highest paying municipalities across both MSAD 58 and RSU 9.

Here are the total **costs per pupil** for each town in MSAD 58:

Why is this happening?

Maine's student enrollment is shrinking statewide.

According to the ME Education Policy Research Institute, Maine has one of the lowest student-to-school ratios in the country, and our district is no exception.

- In 2014, MSAD 58's total preK 12 enrollment was 740.
- By 2023, it was **587**.
- By 2033, NESDEC projects another 23% decrease, leaving just **450** pupils districtwide.

Why it matters: MSAD 58 has too many buildings, and not enough students.

Declining enrollment means our facilities are under capacity, resulting in a higher cost per pupil to operate our schools.
